A Light in the Darkness' in 2021 Holocaust Memorial Day

Following the success of the 'Holocaust Memorial Day' event in Southwold and Reydon in 2020, plans were being discussed for a similar event to take place in January 2021. However because of the coronavirus pandemic restrictions it has been decided that rather than meeting together in person, there will be a live event online via Zoom instead. The theme for 2021 is 'Be a Light in the Darkness' and our event will include a talk by Professor Lawrence Goldman, a historian and the former director of the Institute of Historical Research in London. He is also a Fellow of the Royal Historical Society and a resident of Southwold.

His talk, 'Miriam's Story', will speak of his remarkable family member who shepherded her grandparents, parents and brother to safety from Paris in 1941 through occupied France and Vichy into Spain and onto Lisbon where they took a ship to Jamaica. Aspects of Miriam's story appeared in Anne Sebba's book, Les Parisiennes, about women in Paris under Nazi occupation. Anne Sebba spoke to the Southwold

Archaeological and Historical Society about her book two years ago.

There will also be a film clip of a talk by Mukash Kapila about the Darfur Genocide where an estimated 200,000 people died from violence between 2003 and 2005. The one hour programme will also include music, a poem read by Janet Gershlick, and prayers from Reverend Alan Perry.

The event will take place between 11.30 and 12.30 on Thursday 21st January and everyone is invited to attend. The event can be accessed at:

Kirkley Pantry Opens!

During the first three weeks of Covid-19 lockdown more than 5,300 people contacted the 'Home but not Alone' East Suffolk telephone support line. More than 50% of the calls were for help with shopping because the caller did not have access to online shopping. Between April and the end of June more than 800 visits were made by volunteers in the Kirkley area to deliver shopping to more than 50 households unable to access online food shopping.

In response to the needs of Kirkley community, The Kirkley Pantry, a branch of Your Local Pantry will open on Tuesday 1 December at 10am in Kirkley Church Hall, St Peter's Road, Lowestoft. Kirkley Pantry is not a Food Bank, there are no vouchers, no referral system.

Anyone who has found after paying all the household bills there is very little left over for food can become a member of Kirkley Pantry. It is a membership scheme where for £3.50 each week

Members of Kirkley Pantry can also volunteer, earning work experience credits and increasing skills. Please contact Rev'd Helen Chandler on 01502 589112 if you are interested in volunteering to help with the Pantry-jobs such as: Responsibility for food deliveries. Unpacking and putting food onto shelving/fridge/freezer. General cleaning. Greeting members and guiding them through the Pantry shopping experience. Stock rotation and management. Administration roles. IT roles

If there are any further lockdown restrictions Kirkley Pantry will remain open for shoppers because we can accommodate a single shopper at a time or take telephone orders to be picked up.

Kirkley Pantry not only provides members with access to affordable food, but also cooking experiences, new adventures in food tasting, nutritional information and more. Once the Café is open and members are able to eat and socialise, the Pantry will be a place to make friends, have a nourishing meal, and be signposted to other services when necessary. One of the distinguishing features of Pantries is that the requirements for membership are minimal and there is no pressure for people to move on."

As part of the Lowestoff Food Forum, Kirkley Pantry complements the work of other agencies in the area. Initially open on Tuesdays 10:00 – 3:30. 

















WORLD WAR 2





By December 1940 the Battle of Britain was over, the Germans having postponed their invasion of Britain indefinitely. The night Blitz against London was underway, and would continue with increasing venom until May 1941.

In Lowestoff and other East Suffolk towns and villages, a new threat began to manifest itself, the "hit and run" raider. From their bases in France, Belgium and more importantly Holland, the distance across the North Sea, 100 miles, meant that the Suffolk coast was a mere 20 minutes flying time away. The relatively short distance also meant that fighter-bomber aircraft like the Me 110 and even 'Jabos' - bomb-carrying fighter aircraft like the Me 109 and FW 190 - had the range to reach targets in Suffolk.

Lowestoff featured high on the Luftwaffe's Suffolk target list, minesweepers were built and operated from there, and thousands of sailors received their basic training at HMS Europa, the HQ of the RNPS. The town, or more pointedly the harbour facilities, became "Target No.457".

The Observer Corps (the 'Royal' came later) had a post atop Hamilton House, overlooking the docks and with a commanding view of the coast, but of defences there were few. Only the four Lewis machine-guns of 514 Coast Defence Battery responded against any aerial threat, hardly a deterrent against sudden low-level raids and night raiders flying at 10,000 feet or more.



On 4 December 1940 at 1258 hours, a raider approached Gisleham at 2,000 feet and dropped four bombs on the Pakefield Holiday Camp. Huts and a recreation building were destroyed and an army officer, Lt Latter of 326 coastal Battery, was killed.

On 29 December it was Lowestoft's turn as a Do 17Z made a direct run across the south of the town at 8,000 feet and dropped bombs which wrecked properties in Orchard Terrace and fractured a gas main. People in Anderson shelters had extraordinary escapes in this raid; in one shelter four people were only 7 feet from a crater, and from one of two shelters a mere 6 feet from another, all four occupants again emerged unharmed.

Typical of the pattern of attacks that would be symptomatic of the winter ordeal that would continue well into the new year of 1941 for Lowestoft was the final raid of 1940. At 1622 hours on 31 December 1940, too late for a warning to be sounded via the Observer Corps lookout, a Ju 88 dived across the harbour and released 2 x 250 kg HE bombs before speeding back out to sea. One bomb exploded harmlessly in the harbour. The second scored a direct hit on the bandstand of the South Pier, totally destroying it and blasting a crater in the piling and decking, and cracking the concrete in the spur groyne

nearby. The Pier Pavilion was battered by the blast and a soldier was slightly hurt. 80 properties in Royal Plain, Waveney Road and Pier Terrace had windows damaged.

Everyone knows about the ordeal suffered by London in WW 2. For the people living on the coast in Suffolk during the winter of 1940-41, the terror was to last much longer than anyone knew.

Dear Editor

I refer to Dick Houghton's letter in the November edition of "The Bugle". With regard to his comments regarding Lowestoft Town Council, I would like to correct several points of fact:

They are proposing to spend Council taxes on a food bank Not true. A grant was made towards ESC co-ordinated efforts to support food banks in the early weeks of lockdown, to help with Covid-19 community support/relief, but to date no discussions have taken place regarding further grants to food banks. One of our Town Councillors volunteers at a local food bank in his personal capacity, but not as a Councillor. There are no proposals currently under consideration for Town Councillors to man food banks.

They are proposing to spend Council taxes on...a Memorial Bench to applaud the retirement of Stephen Ardley and Keith Patience". Not true. If it goes ahead, the proposed bench would be funded by County Council locality funding, not Town Council taxes. Nor is the bench being considered as something to mark the retirement of two County Councillors. Whether the bench actually proceeds will depend on time constraints associated with the allocation of locality funding.

They are proposing to spend Council taxes on...a statue to the NHS". Not true. One of our Town Councillors did moot the idea of a piece of public art, to be sited in one of our local parks, as a tribute to the work of NHS staff during the Covid-19 crisis. The artwork would have been funded using Community Infrastructure Levy or Section 106 funds (i.e. funds from developers which have to be spent on community projects), not Town Council taxes. However, the idea has never actually been formally proposed and considered by the Town Council, And once again: 5 of the 19 Town Councillors are Labour Party members. Those numbers do not constitute a political takeover or a controlling majority. Any proposal would require support from Independent Councillors in order to pass.

Dick Houghton has previously made these comments on Facebook and I offered at the time to discuss the concerns he has raised regarding public toilets with him if he wished. Unfortunately, he did not take me up on this offer. The offer still stands.

If Dick does wish to speak with me, I would also be happy to let him know what is happening regarding our parks and the Town Hall.




